Instead of highlighting what's coming up or reflecting on the events of the past month I want to write about **preaching**.

Because preaching is weird.

I mean really, what is a sermon? It's not exactly a lecture. It's not exactly entertainment (although I have dabbled in improv comedy...). It's not a dialogue, or a straight-up speech, or a performance. It's this strange thing that happens for 10-12 minutes every Sunday and it is in a category all of its own.

So here's how I understand preaching: Preaching is what happens when God's life, your life, my life, and the life of the world get jumbled up and then spit out. The way that the Lutheran Church understands preaching is that *it is primarily an encounter*.

Preaching is an encounter with the living Word of God, which is Jesus.

I mean, there's a lot of room for error. (After all, it's a human being doing the work of preaching.) So I'm not saying that *my* word <u>is</u> *God's* word. But I'm saying that if the Holy Spirit is at work, then when we come to the sermon, *despite* my human inclination for error, we will encounter God speaking to us today.

So, you might learn some things, but learning isn't really the goal. You might be entertained, but that's not the goal either. You might be bored and that certainly isn't the goal! The goal is to have an encounter with God and to walk away different—transformed.

So when you come to worship on Sundays and you sit there while I preach, *listen*.

Listen for the ways that God is trying to have an encounter with you.

Notice where the sermon takes *you*—to what associations or memories or relationships? If the Spirit is at work, the words of the sermon will likely move you to the place in your world where the gospel is beginning to do its work on you.

If something I say challenges you, listen to that part of you that's feeling challenged. Or heaven forbid, you feel offended by something I say, listen to that part of you that is feeling offended. And then come talk to me. God might be trying to do something there in all of that! If something I say hits you like a ton of bricks, listen! If you come away with more questions than answers, listen to those questions.

We have an active, engaged God who is always trying to have an encounter with us. In church, and out of church. In sermons, but also at work, at home, at the bar, you name it! Listen!

TACO serves hot meals on Mondays and Fridays, and "to go" lunches on Wednesdays. They also provide medical, dental, and legal clinics throughout the month.

Every month, TACO ...

- Serves 2400 meals
- Files 3200 pieces of mail
- Hands out 1600 items of clothing
- Re-charges 1200 cell phones
- Helps recover over 80 social security cards, IDs, and birth certificates
- Provides more than 100 showers

ELCA NEWS

The 2025 ELCA Churchwide Assembly is being held July 28–Aug. 2, 2025, at the Phoenix Convention Center in Phoenix, Ariz., convening under the theme "For the Life of the Church."

Early in her tenure, current Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton set forth her own convictions to guide the members of the ELCA in understanding our unique identity, and these convictions have become a recognized way of articulating who we are:

We are church.

We are Lutheran.

We are church together.

We are church for the sake of the world.

We are church for the sake of the world—for the abundant life promised by God and fulfilled in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ for all creation.

The ELCA Churchwide Assembly is the primary decision-making body of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. When the ELCA Churchwide Assembly convenes, its voting members meet with confidence in God's grace around word and water, wine and bread, to carry on their work on behalf of the entire church. Over the course of the assembly, voting members (approximately 800) representing every member synod will:


- Hear reports and review the work of churchwide officers, leaders and units.
- Receive and consider proposals from synod assemblies.
- Elect officers, board members, and other leaders as specified by the constitution or bylaws.
- Elect a new Presiding Bishop. The current Presiding Bishop, Elizabeth Eaton, was first elected in 2013 and re-elected in 2019 for a second six-year term. Bishop Eaton will retire at the end of her current term
- Establish ELCA churchwide policy.
- Worship together.
- Adopt a budget.
- Conduct other business related to the ELCA churchwide organization.

Please keep all who are attending in your prayers as they conduct the business of the greater church and representing all of us.

NEW BISHOP ELECTED

We are pleased to announce the election of the Rev. Yehiel Curry as presiding bishop of the ELCA! Bishop-elect Curry was elected on the fifth ballot with 70.34% of the vote.

Ever-living God, strengthen and sustain Bishop-elect Curry, that with patience and understanding he may love and care for your people. Grant that together we may follow in the way of Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.
