Today, we're talking about the importance of getting your butt to church.

But to get at this, I want to share with you the complexities in my brain that often prevent me from saying, "It's time to get your butt to church."

- 1. The church has been exposed time and time again as being a place of dishonesty, fraud, and abuse. So, whereas the pastors who started our church here at St. Peter's inherited a church that was naturally endowed a great deal of cultural trust, the church we have today is a church that is not a de-facto safe place. Which means that I usually don't actually go around telling people to get their butt in church.
- 2. The church of my grandparents and even maybe the church of my parents did not have to square with the reality of religious pluralism quite like we do today. We live in a world of vast religious diversity and call me a heretic, but I do not have any interest in expressing my faith by way of hegemonic power that belittles or demeans the faith of people who are different than me. I believe in Jesus and the power of his love *and* I believe in the inherent value and validity of the faith of my Jewish, Muslim, Sikh, Hindu, and Buddhist neighbors. Which means that I usually don't actually go around telling people to get their butt in church.
- 3. The church has a long history of using guilt and shame to achieve its goals of getting people in the pews. We've looked down our noses at people who only come on Christmas and Easter, who choose sports over worship on Sunday morning, and I *hate* that sentiment. I have no interest in guilting or shaming anyone to do anything. It simply isn't how Jesus operated. Which means that I usually don't actually go around telling people to get their butt in church.

Clearly, there are reasons to pause when considering inviting someone to church. But there are also incredibly compelling reasons in the face of all of this to do just that: to invite someone to join you in getting their butt in church! I believe that now is the time to get serious about asking yourself, "Am I showing up *within* and *for* my faith community in a way that aligns with how much the gospel means to me?" It's time to get serious about not just keeping this treasure for yourself but asking yourself, "Are there people in my life who would benefit from being a part of the church—who need the hope, the love, the promise of the resurrection? Who would benefit from a church family to love and support them? Do I have people in my life who are Christians in their heart but they've lost their way to being a part of a faith community?" What would it look like for you to invite them or assist them in getting connected back up to a faith community?

Because the work of the church is vital in these days. Isolation is an epidemic, hopelessness and anger continue to be on the rise, the needs of our world and our community are growing as migrants face uncertain futures and the unhoused population grows steadily, and once-foundational structure to support these populations are crumbling. The gospel of Jesus Christ speaks directly into each one of these realities providing hope, promise, and a call to act. I believe in the church and the work it does in the world. And so, even though there are a lot of good reasons not to get your butt in church, I am going to invite people to do just that...not so our numbers will soar, but because the church's work is needed in these days for the life of the world.

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3 MUSIC NOTES

I don't know about you, but I enjoy looking at the "before and after" pictures of many renovation projects. They are often inspiring, even though I rarely, if ever, act on that inspiration. The before pictures show us how dark and dreary a room is, with useless space and impairments to the "flow" of the room. The after pictures usually reveal a much brighter, more cheerfully optimized space; somewhere we would want to spend our time. So it is with Easter, we have a before—40 days of Lent—and an after—50 days of Eastertide, from Easter to Pentecost.

St. Augustine explains this in his *Exposition on Psalm 148*. "We have established also the celebration of two seasons, that before Easter and that after Easter. That which is before Easter signifies tribulation...that...after Easter, signifies the bliss in which we shall hereafter be." According to the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops, "...this time is characterized, above all, by the joy of glorified life and the victory over death expressed most fully in the great resounding cry of the Christian: Alleluia!" As Pope St. John Paul II said, "We are an Easter people and Alleluia is our song!"

Eastertide is not just for Catholics, it is for all Christians. All those who celebrate the Resurrection of Jesus, His victory over death, and the new life God has given us through the sacrifice of Christ. It is a joyful time—full of light, music, praise, and NO fasting!

One of my favorite choir anthems is an ebullient and uplifting depiction of Eastertide, *With A Voice of Singing* by Martin Shaw. We have done this here at St. Peter's. You can hear it here: <u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=i2Nv3ya8lEk</u>

Sjögren's Awareness Month!

Sjögren's syndrome is one of the most prevalent yet underrecognized complex autoimmune diseases impacting millions of people around the world. It is the second most common *rheumatic autoimmune disease* in the United States, affecting as many as four million Americans. It is actually more common than better known related diseases, such as *lupus* and *multiple sclerosis*. Despite its widespread reach, awareness remains low, many patients experience delays in diagnosis, and treatment options are limited resulting in the progression of the disease.

Why is it called a *syndrome* anyway? A syndrome is a group of symptoms that occur together and suggest a particular abnormality or condition, often without a known underlying cause. In contrast, a disease is a *specific pathological condition* with a well-defined cause, often with standardized diagnostic criteria. Sjögren's, however, is also considered a "disease" to reflect the seriousness and impact of the condition.

How much do you know about Sjögren's Syndrome? An *autoimmune disease* is where the body mistakenly attacks its own healthy cells and tissues. In Sjögren's syndrome, the body mistakenly attacks the moisture-producing glands throughout the body. It is characterized by chronic dryness, particularly in the eyes and mouth, which are usually ignored initially as those symptoms alone are not thought of as serious.

While dry eyes and dry mouth are hallmark symptoms of Sjögren's, it goes way beyond dryness. It is a complex *systemic*—that which affects the entire body—three-stage condition that causes fatigue, multiple joint pain, and problems including dryness in the bursa sacs, eye problems, difficulty speaking, dental problems, anemia, and affects multiple organs and systems—lung issues, kidney problems, peripheral neuropathy, brain issues, skin problems/rashes, and an increased risk of lymphoma—the third stage of Sjögren's, among other complications that require comprehensive medical management. Diagnosis of Sjögren's can sometimes be difficult or delayed due to the wide range of symptoms mentioned here that overlap with other conditions.

While Sjögren's disease primarily affects women—about 90% of diagnosed cases—it can also occur in men. Men with Sjögren's disease may be underdiagnosed due to the misconception that it is exclusively a women's disease. Proper awareness is essential for accurate diagnosis and treatment.

All this and more is why *Sjögren's Awareness Month* is so important. You may know someone with Sjögren's and not know they have it, or shy away from it because you don't understand their condition, it's just too complicated. Every story shared, every post published, and every conversation started helps bring visibility and understanding to this disease that impacts so many.
