Every day I am bombarded by images of starving and wounded children in Gaza. I sit at my own dinner table with my own children and feel the insane dissonance between the lives of my two kids. So, we turn to scripture for our grounding.

In Genesis 18, God and Abraham have a famous conversation. It starts like this:

20 Then the Lord said, "How great is the outcry against Sodom and Gomorrah and how very grave their sin! 21 I must go down and see whether they have done altogether according to the outcry that has come to me, and if not, I will know."

22 So the men turned from there and went toward Sodom, while Abraham remained standing before the Lord. 23 Then Abraham came near and said, "Will you indeed sweep away the righteous with the wicked? 24 Suppose there are fifty righteous within the city; will you then sweep away the place and not forgive it for the fifty righteous who are in it? 25 Far be it from you to do such a thing, to slay the righteous with the wicked, so that the righteous fare as the wicked! Far be that from you! Shall not the Judge of all the earth do what is just?" 26 And the Lord said, "If I find at Sodom fifty righteous in the city, I will forgive the whole place for their sake."

From there, Abraham (like a pesky child) negotiates with God. What if there are 45 righteous people? What about 40? Until he gets God to agree that even if there are just 10 righteous people, God will not destroy the city.

As I see the events of the starvation and killing of innocent people in Gaza through the lens of this story, it holds up for me just how unacceptable this war is because of the way that there is no distinction between the starvation of the righteous from the wicked. (As a Christian, I have thoughts about even the validity of killing or starving the wicked,

what with the whole commandment not to murder and the fact that ALL people are made in the image of God, but we can save that for another day.)

Last week we felt the horror of gun violence in the United States as two children were killed at their school in Minneapolis. In Gaza, on average 28 children die every day due to bombardments, starvation, malnutrition, or lack of services. That's an entire classroom of kids, every single day. It is not okay.

Our legacy is to follow in the way of Abraham. To beg, plead, negotiate, advocate and GET OBNOXIOUS in our perseverance to insist on the safety of these innocent Palestinian children.

Save these numbers into your phones and call them every week. It only takes a few minutes. Leave a message letting them know that it is important to you that they support legislation that will get food and safety to the children of Gaza. Look up bills that you can specifically ask them to support. Google call scripts if you're not comfortable without one. Ask me and I can help you if you've never called your legislator before!

Consider giving money to World Central Kitchen (<u>wck.org/relief/chefs-for-gaza</u>) or Save The Children (<u>http://www.savethechildren.org</u>) or Lutheran Disaster Response (<u>elca.org/our-work/relief-and-development/lutherandisaster-response</u>).

Pray that the world with be infected with the fervency of Abraham who would not stop until he had the assurance from God that innocent lives would be protected.

You don't have to be an expert to take a small step to ensure that Palestinian children are protected and fed.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Meet the Architect!

On Monday August, 25th the church council voted to select Studio E Architects as the firm that we will begin working with to design our sanctuary remodel.

Studio E Architects' mission statement states, "We design places that cultivate community, enhance well-being, and make the best use of resources. We listen carefully, uncover opportunity and expand possibility."

We came to work with them through a recommendation from Bishop Dave, who worked with them when Christ Lutheran Church in Pacific Beach remodeled their sanctuary in 2000. He writes, "We chose Studio E for the remodel of Christ Lutheran Church in 2000 based on their portfolio and the fact that they had not worked on a sanctuary before. (We wanted a firm that would not bring previous concepts for a worship space into our project.) They were attentive, creative, willing to change directions, and ultimately, they delivered an amazing product. The fact that their design still feels fresh 25 years later is a testament to their work."

We are thrilled to be working with this firm and their talented, energized, creative architects! It is likely that you will meet them at the end of this initial design phase when they have renderings ready to present to us. In the meantime, they will be interfacing with the steering committee to create a design that will best fit our needs and position us to share the love of God well into the future.

August Council Meeting Highlights:

Approved a recommendation from the Finance Committee to designate \$187,000 as seed money for the sanctuary remodel project. The funds are coming from the church operating fund balance, the preschool fund balance, the employee retention credit trust fund, and the building fund balance.

MUSIC NOTES

Gimme that Old Time Religion

I've seen numerous movies and TV shows that contain pious church people trying to sway sinners to their side and especially to their church. One of the most common tools to depict this is through the singing of specific hymns, most likely "Give Me That Old Time Religion." We hear that and immediately we know what religion they are talking about, don't we?

The original version of this hymn is deeply rooted in the African American culture, using the same tune as "Tis the Old Ship of Zion," an earlier spiritual. However, "...Old Time Religion" holds significant influence in white southern gospel revival culture primarily emphasizing saving the lost, rather than sustaining the faith of slaves and former slaves. It became recognized as a traditional folk song of 19th century rural South USA, especially Southern Baptists, where "old-time religion" reflects conservative cultural values and literal biblical interpretation.

Verses have been added and subtracted by various publications and singers over the years. "It was good for our mothers . . . It's good enough for me" or "It has saved our fathers ... It's good enough for me" or "It will do when I am dying . . . It's good enough for me." It has even been used for temperance with verses like "It will make me leave off drinking . . . And 'tis good enough for me" and "I'm for state-wide prohibition."

It is interesting to note, however, that despite this being about "Old Time Religion" none of the many verses contain any reference to Jesus or God, though referencing biblical characters such as Paul, Silas, Daniel, Hebrew children. Perhaps that is appropriate because it is a song about "religion"—cultural values and practices rooted in the past—and not about a relationship with the living God.

Dear Friend of TACO,

We are reaching out with urgency today. Third Avenue Charitable Organization (TACO) is facing a critical moment. Right now, we only have enough funds to cover about one month of operations.

The need in our community continues to grow at an unprecedented pace. Three years ago, 385 people used TACO's address to receive their mail for essential documents like IDs, benefits, and medical correspondence. Today, more than 1,400 people rely on us for this lifeline. Our social worker is booked with clients every day, helping individuals navigate housing, benefits, and other urgent needs. At the same time, more and more individuals are coming to our meal services, showers, and social support.

Meanwhile, costs have skyrocketed while donations have dropped:

- Three years ago, a case of eggs cost \$32, and we needed 2 cases for breakfast. Today, eggs are \$69 per case, and because of growing demand, we now require 4 cases each week.
- Our food banks, which once provided proteins and other commodities, no longer have these critical items available for our meal service.

To keep TACO running each month, it costs \$27,000. In July, we received only \$5,481 in donations. This shortfall has already forced us to cut staff hours, even as the demand for services continues to climb.

Despite these challenges, TACO remains committed to serving over 250 people at each of our community meals, ensuring no one is turned away. But without immediate help, we risk cutting back the very services that so many depend on.

We urgently need your support to keep TACO strong. Your gift today will help us continue providing meals, dignity, and hope for our unsheltered and low-income neighbors in Downtown San Diego.



DONATE TODAY

We are now at the midpoint of my six-year term as bishop of the Pacifica Synod, so this seems like a great moment to pause, evaluate where we are, and set whatever course corrections are needed to accomplish our mutual goals.

In my <u>first newsletter article to the synod</u>, I outlined seven themes that I wanted to shape my time in this office. They were to be my guiding stars as I navigate the myriad demands of this office. These are the themes:

- 1. Radical Inclusivity
- 2. Setting and Context Matter
 - We are a border synod
 - We are a coastal synod
 - We are a diverse synod
- 3. Decentralizing our synod staff is more effective.
- 4. Innovation is essential.
- 5. The parish is more important than the congregation.
- 6. Self-care is not selfish.
- 7. Love is at the center of all we do.



We have made some headway on many of these themes while others are still in process. Here are a few accomplishments that I celebrate:

- We have a deployed staff model with our Regional Assistants to the Bishop. These excellent leaders help with mobility, DEI, Youth ministry, First Call Accompaniment, and our Regional Gatherings and Synod Assemblies.
- We have created a new Assistant to the Bishop for Anti-Racism Coordination position. That position is currently open, and we pray for a new leader to build on the work that we have done so far.
- We have a new position that will strengthen and expand our ministry in Spanish-speaking communities in the Assistant to the Bishop for Latiné Ministry. A new synod strategy is being developed by the leaders of these congregations.
- Our focus on the border has increased. The <u>Day of Theological Reflection</u> and our increased involvement in Border Church have educated and inspired many to action.
- The combination of a shortage of full-time calls and a lack of ministry candidates have moved us to innovate new ways to fill our pulpits. Currently, many congregations are exploring a new model we call Cooperative Ministry Communities that will share pastoral staff and raise up synodically authorized ministers in local congregations.
- We have added resources to help with spiritual guidance and coaching for ministry.
- We opened more avenues for lay education by expanding the use of the <u>Cathryn Wright funds</u>.
- We have seen the birth of <u>Tapestry retreats</u> for people in the LGBTQIA+ communities.
- We have started Regional Gatherings every other year to share and listen more effectively to the people in our congregations.
- We are encouraging rostered leaders to renew their ordination vows in Chrism Services held each Holy Week.
- The synod council has accepted several congregations into synodical administration or synodical preservation and we are walking with these communities through a time of discernment.
- We continue to manage our resources well and give away grants for ministries throughout our synod. We continue to pass along 51% of our mission support to the ministries of the wider ELCA.
- When disaster struck in Maui, we raised over \$140K to support relief work.
- We have worshipped together, marched together, prayed together, sung together, and laughed and cried together.
- We have restarted the Middle School Youth Gathering, and we had the coolest shirts in New Orleans at the High School National Gathering!

There are some other themes that did not get the attention they deserve. We were not as deliberate when it came to our environmental stewardship. Being a coastal synod, we have been called to bear witness to the health of the ocean and the ecosystems of Southern California and Hawai'i.

We could also do a better job of helping each other keep love at the center of all we do. In these challenging times, it is easy to get judgmental and not see people with whom we disagree as children of God instead of enemies. This requires a deep spiritual practice. It is my pledge to you to make sure that I am engaged in this practice and to help our synod do the same.

I would love to hear what you think. As I reach this midpoint in my term, what is the synod doing that is helpful for you? What are we missing? How can I better serve your ministry as your bishop?
